



U.S. SUBMARINES FORCES LOSSES

OCTOBER





Seawolf was announced overdue from patrol and presumed lost with all hands (83 crew and 17 U.S. Army) when it was mistaken for a Japanese submarine and sunk by friendly destroyers just North of Morotai, Republic of the Philippines.





S-44 was sunk by a Japanese destroyer in the Northern Kuril Islands 7 Oct. 1943. 56 men lost. Two men picked up by Japanese destroyer, repatriated at end of war.





Sunk near the La Perouse Strait near Northern Japan, 11 Oct 1943 80 men lost





Lost off Atlantic Coast 12 Oct 1943 to unknown cause.77 men lost.





Escolar's last communication was with Perth on 17 October- she was never heard from again. It is assumed that she struck a mine and sank with all hands. 82 men lost.





Shark was reported as presumed lost with 87 men.

U.S. SUBMARINES FORCES LOSSES (Continued)

OCTOBER CONTINUED





Grounded 24 Oct.1944. 31 Oct. 1944 was destroyed by deck gun of USS Nautilus





Tang's last torpedo broached and curved to the left in a circular run. Tang fishtailed to clear the turning circle of the torpedo, but it struck her abreast the after torpedo room approximately 20 seconds after it was fired. Tang sank by the stern.



O-5 was sold for scrap.

U.S. SUBMARINES FORCES LOSSES (Continued)

NOVEMBER





Albacore was assumed to have been lost. According to Japanese records captured after the war, a submarine assumed to be Albacore struck a mine very close to the shore off northeastern Hokkaido on 7 November. 85 men lost.





The wolfpack, headed by Growler, closed a convoy for attack. The order to commence attacking was the last communication ever received from Growler. She was listed as lost in action against the enemy, cause unknown. 86 men lost.





From records available after the war, it appears that Scamp was sighted by Japanese planes and reported depth charged by a coast defense vessel to the South of Tokyo Bay. 83 men lost.





Corvina topped off with fuel at Johnston Island and was never heard from again. Sunk by Japanese submarine south of Truk on 16 Nov 1943. 82 men lost.





Scuttled in the Gilberts Archipelago on her 9th patrol. The Commanding Officer CDR.Connaway was killed. Capt. Cromwell went down with the ship and was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his act of heroism and devotion to country.

U.S. SUBMARINES FORCES LOSSES (Continued)

DECEMBER





Lost in December 1943 in the Celebes Sea, on her 1st war patrol, with 76 men lost. Cause of loss unknown.





The destruction of the Navy Yard made repairs impossible, and Sealion was ordered destroyed. All salvagable equipment was taken off, depth charges were placed inside, and the explosives were set off to prevent her from being made useful to the enemy.



While maneuvering in exercises at sea, F-1 and F-3 collided, the former sinking in 10 seconds, her port side torn forward of the engine room. 19 of her men were lost, while 3 others were rescued by the submarines with whom she was operating.



S-4 was destroyed by sinking.

Retirees and Disabled Vets Due for Record Raise Next Year

Military retirees and disabled veterans could see their monthly checks jump by hundreds of dollars each month in 2022, the largest increase since 1983.

The annual inflation-based Cost of Living Adjustment, or COLA, soon will be determined by the government, and all the figures point to an increase of at least 6%, and maybe more, beginning in 2022.

That means that next year, military retirees will see their monthly retirement check increase, with the average monthly check going up by around \$160. Veterans receiving disability compensation from the <u>Department of Veterans Affairs</u> also will see their monthly <u>disability payments</u> increase, with the average monthly amount increasing by nearly \$100.

According to the <u>Defense Department</u>, there are around 1.87 million military retirees, with an annual average retirement payment of \$30,265. The <u>VA says</u> nearly 5.1 million veterans receive disability compensation, with an annual benefit of \$18,549.

The annual COLA increase is based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI), which is measured by the Department of Labor. That agency measures the costs of a select group of goods and services and compares those costs to the previous year. If there is an increase, retirees and many others receiving government benefits see an increase in their monthly payments for the upcoming year. If those costs go down, the government payments will remain the same in the upcoming year.

In 2021, costs for most goods and services have gone up much faster than they have in the past. The most recent data from the Department of Labor is showing a 5.4% increase from last year, and there are two more months left in the current fiscal year, which ends on Sept. 30.

So, unless there is a major turnaround of the economy, with prices dropping dramatically in the next month or so, next year's government payments should see a hefty increase.

The CPI also is used to determine federal employee retirement and social security COLA adjustments as well as other federal benefit programs, so the CPI increase will affect over 50 million Americans.

Next year's COLA is scheduled to be announced in early October. ■

Changes from Boot Camp to Shipyards Are Coming in the Wake of the Bonhomme Richard Fire

The <u>Navy</u> is making major changes to its after-hours security and shipyard procedures in the wake of the Bonhomme Richard fire, sailors told Military.com.

The fire aboard the Bonhomme Richard, which was undergoing shipyard maintenance, broke out on <u>July 12, 2020</u>, a Sunday morning when the <u>amphibious assault ship</u> was manned only by the duty section. It began in the ship's "lower V" cargo hold and lasted for <u>four days</u>, burning at more than 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit. The incident is considered the Navy's worst U.S. warship fire outside of combat in recent history.

One of the key changes the Navy is putting in place is an increase in how often senior leaders in duty sections -- sailors who stay aboard when the rest of the crew is off -- walk through the entire ship looking for safety or security issues.

The ship's "engineering duty officer, the fire marshal, the command duty officer and the section leader -- they all have to rove," Senior Chief David Mafoka said during a ship tour of the littoral combat ship Kansas City.

The four leaders, typically senior enlisted personnel or officers, "all have to rove [around the ship] three times a day and they can't do them all together," he explained. "They have to rove through all the engineering spaces, and they're focusing on the firefighting equipment."

A search warrant application unsealed earlier this month revealed that <u>the Navy suspects a disgruntled sailor</u> -- Ryan Sawyer Mays -- of starting the Bonhomme Richard fire.

According to the court document, Lt. Cmdr. Felix Perez, the officer in charge of the ship's damage control efforts, told investigators less than a week after the blaze was put out that three of the four fire stations in the upper and lower V compartments "were not in their normal configuration," adding that he thought that they "appeared to have been purposely tampered with and/or disconnected."

Mafoka said that some requirements for the fire marshal position, the sailor charged with fire safety in the duty section, have been changed to require extra schooling.

Previously, the Navy required only one sailor to patrol the ship, looking for problems. They were typically junior sailors and held no leadership role in the duty section. The change increases both the frequency of the required walkthroughs, as well as the seniority of the sailors tasked with doing so.

The move is "increasing the risk of finding something and decreasing the risk of somebody doing something that they're not supposed to do," Rear Adm. Robert Nowakowski, the <u>deputy commander of the Naval Education and Training Command</u>, explained to Military.com.

Mafoka said there also have been "a lot of additional requirements for when you go into the yards."

That includes a stipulation to place quick disconnect fittings on the hoses and pipes that are run throughout a ship undergoing maintenance. The lack of those fittings is believed to have contributed to the spread of the fire on the Bonhomme Richard.

"One of the problems on BHR was they tried to compartmentalize some of the spaces, and we found out that there was hoses going in-between space to space to space -- they couldn't shut the doors," Nowakowski said.

"You couldn't set the boundaries [to stop the fire from spreading]," he added.

Nowakowski said the Navy is considering increasing how much firefighting training sailors get in boot camp in the wake of the catastrophe.

"We're looking at expanding [boot camp] from an eight-week curriculum to a 10-week curriculum," he said.

The hope is to use some of that extra time to provide "additional firefighting and damage control training to the sailors," he added.

On July 29, the Navy <u>announced that Mays had been charged</u> under Article 110, wrongful hazarding of a vessel, and Article 126, aggravated arson, of the <u>Uniform Code of Military Justice</u> in connection with the blaze.

Gary Barthel, the defense attorney for the accused sailor, said that his "client is <u>adamant that he's not guilty</u> of anything that he's been charged with."

"He maintains his innocence," he added.

Dismantling of the Bonhomme Richard <u>began April 15</u> after it was determined it would take at least \$2.5 billion and five years to fix the ship. ■


