



If your in the neighborhood stop by the clubhouse, pull up a chair and have a bowl of chili or another item from our lunch menu. Checkout out the weeky specials



Memorial Committee Update

The sail of the USS Flasher will soon be undergoing a makeover! The Navy's History and Heritage Command (HHC) is financing a refurbishment if the sail of the USS Flasher, a focal point of the USSVI WWII National Memorial East located in Groton. The refurbishment will include stripping paint and rust from both the inside and outside of the sail, treating surfaces to inhibit future rusting, and painting the structure inside and out. The process is expected to take about 90 days and should begin in the early months of 2023. HHC awarded the contract to LBI, a local company which was responsible for the refurbishment of the NR1 at the Submarine Force Museum and Library.

In preparation for the work, the Memorial Committee has removed all the tools and supplies which were stored in the sail. We are grateful to the City of Groton Public Works Department which assisted in the removal of equipment and is storing all equipment until the refurbishment is complete.



We continue sending Eternal Patrol Notices to the entire membership when a member of Groton Base departs on Eternal Patrol. These notices are sent out by John "Gumba" Carcioppolo.

But we are only as good as the information that we get. If we don't know of a members passing, we can not provide the information.

Please ensure that your families know that when you have passed to contact is Groton Base Chaplain Earl Colella 734-730-1026 <u>chaplain@ussvigroton.org</u> or John Carcioppolo 860-514-7064 <u>gumba700@comcast.net</u> and if possible provide a link to the obituary.

The Chaplain then works with the family to determine if the Honors Detail is desired and sets up the schedule. John C. sends out the Eternal Patrol notice and includes the Honors Detail notification.

The sooner we know the information the more timely we can put out the notices. As indicated in red above often we find out about the passing of a member long after the funeral and do not get the chance to provide honors for our Shipmates.

We have developed a Policy and Procedure Manual for the Honors Detail. Many thanks to Robert Sharpe for putting it together. It is at the Executive Board for approval.

The Homecoming Detail recently provided Honors for USS SOUTH DAKOTA (SSN 790) as they returned home from deployment just in time for Christmas. Welcome Home Warriors and thanks for what you do.

We have obtained the procedures for Burial At Sea. The guidance and these procedures are posted on the Groton Base Web Page at https://www.ussvigroton.org/burialatsea Using the guidance provided and the documents from this link a Navy Member's family can request a Burial At Sea and can be sure it runs smoothly. If your desires are to be buried at sea, we strongly recommend that you print these documents and keep them with your important papers for when you pass to make it easier for your family to execute your last wishes.

Memories of Joe – By John Carcioppolo

I recently had the opportunity to visit twice with an old friend and mentor Joe Negri.

I first met Joe in 1981 when I first joined SUBVETS. I was introduced to him by Jerry Tighe. He was sitting at the end of the clubhouse bar. The club was barely lit and Joe was working on a crossword puzzle drinking a Miller High Life. Jerry introduced me to him. Joe looked at me over his glasses and said "another F'n Nuke". He came across as grizzled and tough.

He was also the first SUBVET WWII that I had met and he was a decorated one. He had a Silver Star, and a Bronze Star with the "V" device which he received during WWII onboard USS TAU-TOG (SS 199). He was also a very proud Pearl Harbor Survivor, but he wasn't on a Submarine then. He was stationed on USS AYLWIN (DD 355) at the time.

I filled out my membership application and Joe signed my membership card like he had done for so many others. I wish I still had it.

I became friends with Joe and soon after he hired me as a bartender. I often relieved him as the bartender. He would hang around for a bit drinking a Miller High Life working on his crossword puzzle watching his favorite show Hawaii Five-O. During those times we talked a lot about various subjects. National, his personal back ground, various members and customers.

I really got to know him pretty well through our conversations.

I learned that when he took over as the National President for SV WWII, his first order of business as National President was to announce that he was going to establish an organization for all Submariners. That took a lot of courage and he was pretty unpopular with many of the SV WWII for this decision. But he set his course and held true.

I learned that when USSVI was formed he was no where's around at that final meeting in Oct 1963 in NJ. Joe was deployed on PIPER to the Med during that time frame. But Joe had gotten the wheels rolling in 1962, and then made a full court press when he returned from deployment and THRESHER was lost in April 1963. He was heavily involved in the incorporation of the organization in 1964.

Joe was one of two individuals who was both National President SUBVETS WWII and National Commander USSVI. The other was Tudor Davis another member of Groton Base and another friend that I met through Joe.

I learned that his thinking was very forward thinking about several things. The forming of USSVI, the WWII Memorial and the Clubhouse to name a few.

He nicknamed me "Flying Cloud". In 1982 he talked me into running for Base Secretary which I did and held the position until 1984 when I went back to Sea Duty. I was honored to have him at my CPO initiation in 1984.

Joe didn't have a fondness for women at the club but he took

a liking to Dee and he took her on with the House Committee as one of the waitresses for Brunch and Dinners. He had a fondness for her. She would send him cookies and chocolates when we moved to DC in 1991. In turn in Dec 1991 he sent her some puca beads from his HI visit for the 50th anniversary of Pearl Harbor. She still has those beads today.

My father-in-law had moved in with us in the mid 80s and Joe liked him too. He would cover for Joe when Joe would make his fishing trips to Canada and other vacations. He even gave my father-in-law the coveted secret recipe for the SUBVETS Chili.

After his passing it was brought up at a meeting by his close friend Morgan Bailey to name the clubhouse the Dominic "Joe" Negri Clubhouse to honor him. It was overwhelmingly approved by the membership. Morgan purchased the sign out front and in 1999 the clubhouse was formally named for Joe.

In 2001 the Cold War Memorial Committee chaired by VADM Albert J Baciocco, Jr. USN (Ret) was working hard at establishing their Memorial in Charleston SC. They wanted to honor someone who represented Submarine Veterans on Eternal Patrol. And Naturally Joe's name came up. I was contacted and they wanted a biography of Joe, which I provided. They honored Joe with a very nice bench when the Memorial was established in 2002.

Today there are many benches that populate the grounds of the Memorial. Joe's bench is located on the walkway on the port side of the Memorial. A little bit aft of the Sail. It is directly across from the USS THRESHER and USS SCORPION Memorials. All the other benches are gray marble. But Joe's is the only one made of black marble, and it's a beauty. See picture below.

In October I was in Charleston for a DALLAS reunion and I stopped by his bench to say hi.

In December I made a work trip to Pearl Harbor. And like I always do when I'm in Pearl I stopped by to pay my respects to my friend. I never regret the time I spend visiting with Joe.

If anyone is out there and wants to stop by he's in the third section on the right. Plot CT3-I, 400, 410.

I am privileged and Honored that Joe Negri considered me his friend. I consider our friendship special. Shipmate Negri, Rest your oar. We owe you a dept of gratitude for your service in WWII, and the Cold War and for all that you did for USSVI.

TOXIC EXPOSURE **SCREENING INFORMATION**

VA is committed to providing screening, health care, and resources to Veterans with toxic exposure concerns from military service.

TOXIC EXPOSURES

While toxic exposure is defined by law, generally there are several types of possible exposures or hazards Veterans may have experienced during their military service. Some common examples appear below.

- Open Burn Pits/Airborne Mazards: Contaminants or substances in the air including smoke and fumes from open burn pits and fine particulate matter.
- Guif War related exposures: Veterans may have been exposed to a variety of environmental hazards including. pesticides and oil well fires.
- Agent Orange: An herbicide used to thin-out thick foliage commonly found in jungles and fields.
- Radiation: Exposure from sources such as nuclear weapons.
- Camp Lejeune contaminated water exposure: Between August 1, 1953, and December 31, 1987, Veterans and their families may have been exposed to contaminated drinking water.
- Other exposures: There are other potential toxic exposures that may occur during military service.

REGISTRY HEALTH EXAMS

Registry health exams are no-cost voluntary environmental exposure medical exams. VA has several health registries – these include: Agent Orange, Airborne Hazard and Open Burn Pit, Gulf War (includes Operations Iraqi Freedom and New Dawn), ionizing Radiation, Depleted Uranium Follow-Up Program. Embedded Fragment Surveillance Center.

- You may be eligible to participate in one or more of these health registries. Note: The registry evaluation is not a compensation exam or required for other VA benefits.
- Registries can alert you to possible health problems related to your military service and help VA better understand and respond to these health problems more effectively.

VA PRESUMPTIVE CONDITIONS

Veterans may be eligible for disability benefits and/or compensation if they have a health condition that results in disability and was connected to their military service. For many health conditions, you need to prove that your service caused your condition. For some conditions, we automatically assume (or "presume") that your service caused your condition. We call these "presumptive conditions."We consider a condition presumptive when it's established by law or regulation. If you have a presumptive condition, you do not need to prove that your service caused the condition. You only need to meet the service requirements for the presumption.

- » Veterans with presumptive diseases may be eligible for benefits such as disability compensation
- » Surviving spouses, dependent children and/or parents of deceased Veterans may be eligible for benefits such as dependency and indemnity compensation and accrued benefits

BURIAL AT SEA—What you need to know

<u>As editor of Boat Notes Newsletter, I am re-running this article to make sure all readers and</u> <u>family members know the process needed to have your remains buried at sea.</u>

The process for burial at sea is provided in a separate article.

As a follow up to your request for information on the burial at sea procedure I submit the following:

Upon getting the initial info from you, Mrs. Davis contacted the chaplain's office in Norfolk and received directions on the submittal of Larry Davis' cremains. She was instructed on how to package the cremains, a flag (obtained at the post office at no charge), and the certificate of death from the funeral director. She was informed that Norfolk was the only sub base that participated in the burial at sea program and that there might be a delay depending on the availability of a sub and their schedule.

In July, Nancy was informed that Master Chief Davis was placed aboard the USS New Mexico for completion of the burial process. Approximately ten days later Nancy was notified that Larry was committed to the sea and the specific latitude and longitude of the commitment. She was also advised that she would receive a call from the C.O. when the deployment was completed.

Last week Mrs. Davis received a very nice call from the C.O. with details of the burial, much sympathy, and advised her that she would receive a package in a few days. Last Saturday she got the package via Federal Express which included the ceremony flag, a ships challenge coin, details of the ceremony and a picture of the sub.

Nancy and I greatly appreciate your kindness and efforts in making this possible. I sincerely hope this info will be beneficial to some of our other brothers at the Phin.

Once again, thanks very much.

"The fate of the Clamagore"

With an assist from a tugboat, the historic Clamagore is set to sail from Patriots Point for its final ocean voyage by the end of the week. The decommissioned Navy submarine will be towed from its longtime home along the Mount Pleasant waterfront around noon on Oct. 14, weather permitting, after a public send-off to Norfolk, Va., where the rusting vessel will be recycled, spokesman Chris Hauff said.

The board that oversees state owned Patriots Point Naval & Maritime Museum decided earlier this year to dismantle the Clamagore after years of grappling with what to do with the aging sub. The decision followed exploration of "numerous alternatives," including making it an underwater reef, finding a new home for it and fixing it.

Patriots Point has said repairing the Clamagore would be cost-prohibitive. A 2019 estimate from a marine surveying and consulting company estimated the figure at more than \$9 million. Moving it onto dry land also was deemed too expensive. Multiple reefing plans fell through. "Unfortunately, we cannot financially sustain the maintenance of three historic vessels," Patriots Point said in March after it voted to recycle the sub.

"The USS Yorktown and USS Laffey also need repair, and we are fighting a never-ending battle against the corrosion that comes from being submerged in saltwater." Some of the components and other artifacts from the Clamagore will be saved for an exhibit at Patriots Point.

The cost of recycling the sub will come to about \$2 million. The process has included the removal of more than 500 batteries weighing more than 450,000 pounds in order to increase the buoyancy of the ves-



sel for its journey up the coast to Virginia. Workers this week will be removing a breakwater at a neighboring marina so a tugboat can safely pull the Clamagore from the shore, Hauff said. The structure will then need to be immediately reinstalled. "That's why the weather isso important," he said Tuesday. The move was scheduled to take place earlier this month. Hurricane Ian pushed back the timing to this week.

Public tours of the Clamagore were halted in mid-December, when a Patriots Point staffer found a leak in the main ballast tank. Concerns about the display vessel go back years, mostly about the extensive corrosion. Another worry is the environmental risks from chemical leaks if the sub were to sustain serious structural damage from a major storm.

Built too late for action in World War II, the vessel is best known for its service during the Cold War-era while it was stationed in Key West, Fla., where it was nicknamed the "Grey Ghost of the Florida Coast."

The sub was modified twice, the second time to become one of only nine submarines converted to the Guppy III configuration — the top-of line upgrade for diesel-powered subs. It was decommissioned in 1975 and has been docked at Patriots Point for the past 41 years.

The Story of USS Flasher SS249

First and second war patrols, January – May 1944

Flasher arrived at <u>Pearl Harbor</u> from <u>New London</u> 15 December 1943 to prepare for her first war patrol, for which she sailed 6 January 1944. Bound for her patrol area off Mindoro, she sank her first target 18 January, sending a 2,900-ton former <u>gunboat</u> to the bottom. Adding to what would be the greatest total of

enemy tonnage credited to an American submarine in <u>World War II</u>, she sank a freighter off Manila 5 February, and sank two cargo ships of the same convoy on 14 February. *Flasher* arrived at Fremantle, Australia 29 February to refit. The 2 vessels sunk 14 February 1944 were the *Minryo Maru* and the *Hokuan Maru*. See [1]. (The *Hokuan Maru* probably rammed and sunk the <u>Grayling</u> 9 September 1943.)

Action-bound once more, the submarine departed Fremantle 4 April 1944 for the coast of <u>French Indochi-</u><u>na</u> on her second war patrol. On 29 April she contacted the french river gunboat *Tahure* guarding a freighter off the Hon Doi Islands, and sank both. After sinking a large cargo ship in the Sulu Sea 3 May, *Flasher* shaped course for Fremantle, arriving 28 May for refit until 19 June.

Third and fourth war patrols, June – October 1944

Flasher made her third war patrol in the South China Sea, where on 28 June 1944 she contacted a heavily escorted convoy of 13 ships. She made a cautious approach, undeterred by the escort, and shortly after midnight 29 June, broke into the convoy to sink a freighter and badly damage a large passenger cargo ship. Her next victim was a freighter, sunk 7 July. Twelve days later, *Flasher* sighted <u>cruiser</u> <u>*Õi*</u> escorted by a <u>destroyer</u>. Two attacks, each followed by a heavy <u>depth charge</u> retaliation from the destroyer, sufficed to sink the cruiser, a fact confirmed several hours later when a <u>periscope</u> observation revealed only the destroyer in sight. Seven days later, she sank another important target, a merchant tanker, and the same day damaged another tanker later sunk by one of her sisters. With all her torpedoes gone, *Flasher* put back for Fremantle, where she replenished and refitted between 7 August and 30 August.

During her fourth war patrol, in the Philippines, *Flasher* headed a <u>coordinated attack group</u> which included two other submarines, <u>Hawkbill</u> and <u>Becuna</u>. Although she was on lifeguard station during the air attacks preliminary to the invasion of the Philippines during part of this patrol, *Flasher* sank three ships, a former light cruiser on 18 September, a transport on 27 September, and a cargo ship on 4 October. She returned to Fremantle 20 October.

Fifth and sixth war patrols, November 1944 – April 1945

Heading the same attack group, *Flasher* now commanded by Lieutenant Commander G. W. Grider, sailed on her fifth war patrol 15 November 1944, bound for Cam Ranh Bay. On 4 December one of her companions reported a tanker convoy, and *Flasher* set a converging course. As she made her approach in a heavy downpour, a destroyer suddenly loomed up before her, and *Flasher* launched her first spread of torpedoes at this escort. The destroyer was stopped by two hits, and began listing and smoking heavily. *Flasher* got a spread of torpedoes away at a tanker before she was forced deep by a second destroyer, which dropped 16 depth charges. Rising to periscope depth, *Flasher* located the tanker burning and covered by yet a third destroyer. Speedily reloading, she prepared to sink the destroyer and finish off the tanker, and though almost blinded by rainsqualls, she did so with a salvo of four torpedoes, two of which hit the destroyer, and two of which passed beneath her, as planned, to hit the tanker. Once more, counter-attack

forced *Flasher* down, and when she surfaced she found no trace of the two damaged destroyers. The tanker, blazing away, was still guarded by three escorts until abandoned at sunset, when *Flasher* sank her with one torpedo. The two destroyers, both found after the war to have been sunk,

were <u>Kishinami</u> and Iwanami (However, the destroyer Iwanami did not exist. The character for "岸" in Ki-

shinami(岸波) could have been confused with "岩"(Iwa)) *Flasher*'s war patrol reported that her count of destroyers may have been inaccurate, but this seems to have been ignored, and it is likely

that *Flasher* actually finished off previously crippled *Kishinami* and did not hit any other destroyer. *Flasher* contacted another well-guarded tanker convoy on the morning of 21 December 1944, and she began a long chase, getting into position to attack from the unguarded shoreward side. In rapid succession, *Flasher* attacked and sank three of the tankers, receiving no counter-attack since the enemy apparently believed he had stumbled into a minefield. One of these tankers was the largest *Flasher* sank during the war. The other two tankers had displacements similar to each other, were tied for third largest.

Refitting at Fremantle once more between 2 January and 29 January 1945, *Flasher* made her sixth war patrol on the coast of Indochina. Contacts were few, but on 21 February she sank a sea truck by surface gunfire, and 4 days later sank a cargo ship with torpedoes. She completed her patrol upon her arrival at Pearl Harbor 3 April 1945, and sailed a few days later for a West Coast overhaul.

Post-war

Bound for Guam on a seventh war patrol at the close of the war, *Flasher* was ordered back to New London, where she was decommissioned and placed in reserve 16 March 1946, attached to the <u>Atlantic Reserve</u> <u>Fleet</u>. On 1 June 1959 the *Flasher* was struck from the <u>Naval Vessel Register</u>. She was sold for scrap on 1 June 1963. Her <u>conning tower</u> was removed and placed on display as a memorial at the entrance to Nautilus Park, a Navy housing area in Groton, Connecticut. It was then moved to the intersection of Thames St. and Bridge St. where it is the centerpiece of the World War II memorial that honors the 52 U.S. submarines and their valiant crews lost during the war. Its upkeep was originally the responsibility of the Submarine Veterans of World War II organization and was then transferred into the willing (and usually younger) hands of the U. S. Submarine Veterans, Inc.

Awards

Flasher received the <u>Presidential Unit Citation</u> for her brilliantly successful third, fourth, and fifth war patrols. For her six war patrols, each designated "Successful", she received six <u>battle stars</u>.

USS SCORPION (SS-278) Lost on Jan 5,1944 with the loss of 77 officers and men in the East China Sea, on her 4th war patrol. It is assumed she was sunk by a mine.

USS ARGONAUT (APS-1/SS-166) Lost on Jan 10, 1943 with the loss of 102 officers and men off Rabaul, on her 3rd war patrol. While attacking a convoy, she torpedoed a Jap destroyer who along with 2 other destroyers depth charged her. As she tried to



USS S-36 (SS-141) Lost on Jan 20, 1942 with no loss of life, on her 2nd war patrol. She ran hard aground on a reef and radioed for help. The entire crew was rescued by a Dutch ship



USS SWORDFISH (SS-193) Lost on Jan 12,1945 with the loss of 89 officers and men somewhere near Okinawa, on her 13th war patrol. Probably was lost to a mine.



USS S-26 (SS-131) Lost on Jan 24,1942 with the loss of 46 officers and men in the Gulf of Panama, on her 2nd war patrol. She was rammed by the USS PC-460 and sunk within seconds. The CO, XO and one lookout on the bridge, were the only survivors.

U.S. SUBMARINES FORCES LOSSES (Continued)

FEBRUARY



USS Barbel (SS-316) Lost on Feb 4,1945 with the loss of 81 officers and men on her 4th war patrol. Based on Japanese records, she was bombed near the southern entrance to the Palawan Passage. The day before, she reported she survived 3 depth charge attacks.



USS Shark I (SS-174) Lost on Feb 11,1942 with the loss of 59 officers and men on her 1st war patrol. Shark was the 1st US submarine sunk by enemy surface craft in the Pacific. She was most likely sunk by depth charges.



USS Amberjack (SS-219) Lost on Feb 16,1943 with the loss of 72 officers and men on her 3rd war patrol Off Rabaul, she was attacked by a Japanese patrol plane, attacked by a torpedo boat and then depth charged by a subchaser. One additional man was killed earlier on the last patrol.



USS Grayback (SS-208) Lost on Feb 26,1944 with the loss of 80 officers and men on her 10th war patrol. She appears to have been caught on the surface in the East China Sea by a Japanese carrier plane whose bombs made a direct hit. During this patrol she sank 4 ships totaling 21,594 tons and was tied for 11th in the number of ships sunk.



USS Trout (SS-202) Lost on Feb 29,1944 with the loss of 81 officers and men on her 11th war patrol. She was sunk by escorts in the middle of the Philippines Basin after sinking a passengercargoman and damaging another in a convoy. She carried out several notable special missions, including carrying over two tons of gold bullion out of Corregidor in February 1942.

MARCH

















USS Perch (SS-176) Lost on March 3,1942 near Java with no immediate loss of life, while on her 1st war patrol. She survived 2 severe depth chargings in less than 200 feet of water by 3 Japanese destroyers. The crew abandoned ship and scuttled her. Of the 59 officers and men taken prisoner, 53 survived the war and six died as POWs.

USS Grampus (SS-207) Lost on March 5,1943 with the loss of 71 officers and men, on her 6th war patrol. She was lost in Vella Gulf, sunk after engaging 2 Japanese Destroyers.

USS H-1 (SS-28) Lost on March 12, 1920 with the loss of 4 men as they tried to swim to shore after grounding on a shoal off Santa Margarita Island, off the coast of Baja California, Mexico. Vestal (AR-4), pulled H-1 off the rocks in the morning of 24 March, only to have her sink 45 minutes later in some 50 feet of water. She was originally named the USS Seawolf before becoming H-1.

USS Triton (SS-201) Lost on March 15,1943 with the loss of 74 men. She was sunk north of the Admiralty Islands during a fight with 3 Japanese Destroyers. Triton was the 1st boat to engage the enemy in December 1941 off Wake Island, sinking 9 ships, 1 submarine and a destroyer.

USS Kete (SS-369) Lost on March 20,1945 with the loss of 87 officers and men at the end of her 2nd war patrol. Probably sunk near Okinawa, by a Japanese submarine that itself was subsequently lost.

USS F-4 (SS-23) Lost on March 25, 1915 with the loss of 21 men. She foundered 1.5 miles off of Honolulu when acid corrosion of the lead lining of the battery tank let seawater into the battery compartment, causing loss of control. She was raised in August 1915.

USS Tullibee (SS-284) Lost on March 26,1944 with the loss of 79 officers and men, on her 4th war patrol. It's believed she was a victim of a circular run by one of her own torpedoes. The lookout was the only survivor and he survived the war as a Japanese prisoner.

USS Trigger (SS-237) Lost on March 26,1945 with the loss of 89 officers and men, on her 12th war patrol. She was lost during a combined attack by Japanese antisubmarine vessels and aircraft. Trigger ranked 7th in total tonnage sunk and tied for 8th in number of ships sunk.
